


The life of today's college student is fraught with challenges that were **unimaginable** even one generation ago.



SHABBAT DINNER

At Chabad at CU, Shabbat dinner is the heart and soul of the students' week. A time when students can kick back and relax, enjoy a home-cooked meal, and celebrate the holiday together. The atmosphere is electric as conversation, comradely, and brief Torah wisdom shared by Rabbi Yisroel permeate the evening.

COUNSELING

Students and parents know that the rabbi and rebbetzin are available 24/7. Rabbi Yisroel and Leah are here to offer confidential support, sound relationship advice, assist in helping students with drug and/ or alcohol problems, and guide the Jewish Buffs in their lifecycle needs from marriage to the celebration of a child's birth to the passing of a loved one.

WOMEN'S EVENTS

Women have special events just for them. Each year they gather together to be pampered and to give back to others during Manicure for the Cure Spa Night. There also is a Women's Shabbat that nurtures their unique spiritual side. Each month, Leah offers women's only classes that address issues specific to them.

SOCIAL EVENTS

Social events are a huge part of Chabad. Deli Night, Jewish Bowling League, and our Monthly Guys' Night are just a few of the fun activities that bring the community together.

- Deli Night: 30–50 students/week
- Jewish Bowling League: 35 students
- Guys' Night Out: 90 students/semester



EDUCATION

Education is a key component at Chabad. Students have many different choices, including the national Sinai Scholars program, group study through Lunch and Learn, or one-on-one sessions.

ISRAEL

Our beloved land of Israel is not a country far, far away. It's our birthright, our homeland. Chabad provides educational programming such as Ambassadors for Israel, an occasional guest speaker like a former IDF soldier, and an annual Birthright Israel trip.

Every year, several major programs extend way beyond our Chabad at CU community. Those programs are Shabbat 500 and the Jewish Festival, both of which take a tremendous amount of time and resources to create an amazing and unforgettable experience.

HOLIDAY CELEBRATIONS

Holiday celebrations are another highlight of the year. From Rosh Hashana to Chanukah to Pesach. students participate in services, meals, and nurturing the ruach of the holiday. Through extensive preparation and pre-holiday distribution, every student has the opportunity to have a Seder with matzos, whether at Chabad or at his or her own home for friends and family. During Chanukah, hundreds of menorahs are distributed to students on campus and during Sukkot, students know they'll find Rabbi Yisroel riding around in the portable sukkah, giving them the chance to shake lulav and etrog.
